Basics

allows ordinary people to play an active role in shaping economic, social, cultural, political and environmental aspects of life

is an alternative to capitalism

aims to transform the social and economic system that includes public, private, and third sectors

Social Solidarity Economy (SSE)...

is not only about the poor, but strives to overcome inequalities in all classes of society has the ability to take best practices that exist in our present system (ex. efficiency) and transform them to serve the welfare of the community based on different needs



5 Principles

1. Solidarity

- Founded on values of cooperation, mutualism, reciprocity, altruism, love, caring, gifting, and sharing.
- Confronting values
 of individualizations,
 competitiveness, and the
 divisiveness of racism,
 sexism, classism, etc.
- Ex. resource sharing among organizations

3. Participatory Democracy

- Voluntary participation in the decision making structures
- Enables action to take place as locally as possible
- Rooted in self management, collective ownership and sovereignty
- Democratic allocation of surplus value is a core compound of the SSE

2. Sustainability

- Movement for 'The Rights of Mother Earth"
- Current mode of production does not allow for true sustainability so it is often commodified and sold back to us
- Ex. we dont have time to grow and prepare dinner for ourselves when we work 40 hours a week so we have to buy it

4./5. Pluralism and Equity

- Pluralism assumes that people of different backgrounds can participate equally in decision-making processes.
- There is no 'one size fits all approach. Like any healthy ecosystem, the solidarity economy flourishes with a full spectrum of interconnected practices


Solidarity Economy Iceberg
